Homeowners and business owners are invited to learn what they can do on their own property to reduce runoff and protect our water resources.

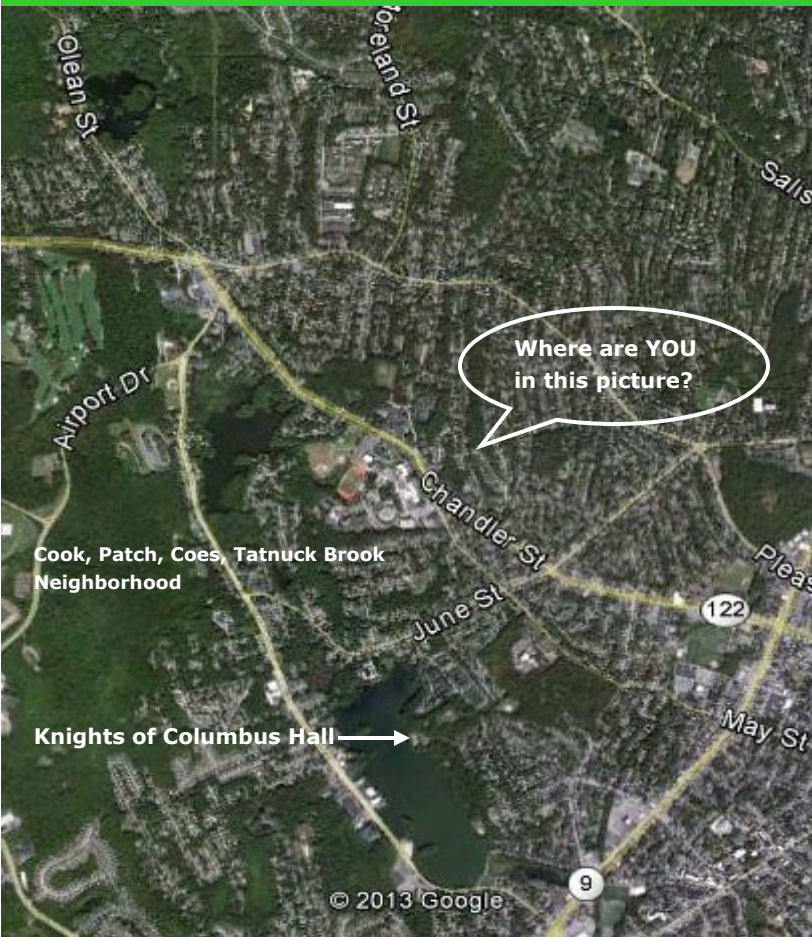
